JCB factory tour including lunch and visit to Shugborough Hall



This years day trip is open to the whole village and the Kineton Regent Club and packs in a busy day with a variety of interests which we hope will appeal to a wide audience.

Our Johnsons executive coach collects us from Oxhill, Tysoe and Kineton on route to the impressive headquarters of the JCB factory in Rocester, south of Uttoxeter. This hugely successful, privately owned, British company has an international market for its earthmoving equipment. Chairman Anthony Bamford lives fairly locally to us at Daylesford, known best for its upmarket country store run by his wife. The tour of JCB includes a theatre presentation, a tour of the JCB 'museum' and a tour of the factory production line. All aspects are wheelchair friendly and from past experience very well organised.

We all then have lunch in the JCB visitor centre restaurant , with two 'organic' courses and coffee.

After lunch we are back on the coach for a short trip to Shugborough Hall, home of the late Lord Lichfield and now under National Trust management. Lots to

see here – the mansion itself, Park Farm , walled gardens and extensive parkland. Motorised buggys available. The Mansion Tea Room and Park Farm café provide refreshments.

ROAD SAFETY ALERT

Hedgehogs are out of hibernation now the weather is warmer and are roaming all over the village in search of food at night. The biggest killer of hedgehogs is cars. Tragically there was a squashed hedgehog on the side of the road in Main Street recently. Hedgehogs can certainly run when they are inclined to do so but unfortunately their natural instinct upon hearing a car is to roll into a ball and lie still, all too often in the road.

When driving in the village in the night please take extra care and attention to make sure you can avoid them. Take special care in Beech Road from Main Street to Oxhill Manor and in Back Lane as we know hedgehogs are very active in this area.

It is not only hedgehogs who are in danger. I have witnessed some extraordinarily fast driving in the village lanes lately. Many lanes are single track with no pavement and are regularly used by dog walkers, horse riders and families with small children. There is no where for them to go should you suddenly happen to come across them in our lanes. The consequences are too awful to think about. Please drive with caution in these lanes.

Oxhill Garden Club

I suggested in last month's Oxhill News that members attending the talk on Thursday 12th April by the leading authority on bees, Stephen Falk, would be in for a treat. Indeed we were! Stephen showed us slides featured in his book 'British Bees' and regaled us with stories of these insects' nesting and behavioural habits. He took us to the wild parts of Britain where he had taken his photographs of some of the rarer bees – sometimes their last tenuous stronghold. The good news was that some endangered species were recovering and, indeed, one species which had died out in the UK had been successfully reintroduced with bees brought in from Scandinavia.

With the reality of global warming, insect species in general are migrating northward and we have been joined by several 'new' bees from across the Channel. Not all insect incursions are welcome, however, and we need to look out for the Asian Hornet which, since its arrival in Italy from China, in six short years has devastated beekeeping in mainland Europe.



Stephen encouraged us as gardeners to plant insect friendly plants and, perhaps, install a bee 'hotel' with different sized 'tubes' which some of the 200 species of solitary bee will, almost certainly, visit to lay their eggs. What could be finer, too, than sitting with a glass of wine on a summer evening watching bees and hoverflies collecting nectar from a herb patch in your garden.



The next meeting is our annual **Plant Sale on Thursday 10th May** - 6.00pm set up / delivery of plants for a 7.00pm start of sale. Thin out those crowded borders and look to the greenhouse and cloches for seedlings surplus to your requirements. Pick up a bargain and / or that variety, plant or shrub you've always wanted!

EXUBERANCE AND SERENITY

Richard Emms' choir, Stour Singers, brings two glorious and contrasting works to Shipston in their May concert: John Rutter's exuberant "Magnificat", and Gabriel Faure's serene "Requiem".

On Saturday May 12th at 7.30.p.m. in St. Edmund's Church, returning soloists Ruth Holton (soprano) and Robert Rice (baritone), and the accomplished Queen's Park Sinfonia join the choir to perform these two beautiful choral

pieces. Rutter's "Magnificat" is full of rhythmic exuberance and an immediate sense of celebration, with truly memorable tunes. First performed in 1990, it was premiered in the UK a year later at Coventry Cathedral. Inspired by J.S. Bach's "Magnificat", it includes a moving setting of a 15th century poem – "Of A Rose". Faure's Requiem, composed in the late 19th century over a protracted period has many thrilling moments, and leaves us with a wonderful sense of peace and tranquillity in its concluding piece "In Paradisum", truly evoking concepts of paradise.

Another month of unusual weather! Having photos charting what we are doing and how the orchard is looking over the years it is easy to see that this year we

are at least three weeks behind the usual bud break and blossom. But as always things will catch up as the temperature rises, hopefully no very late hard frost like last year!

The weeds are growing strongly and some of them are providing much needed flowers for the early bees. A watchful eye is looking for the first signs of the dandelions which always provide an amazing display! They will be kept cut back to reduce the number of seeds that spread so easily The cowslips are looking beautiful and we should have a good display of wild flowers this summer.

A lot of the weeding and feeding as been completed but there is still a lot of soft fruit that needs their spring boost. The autumn raspberries are at last showing signs of life and the new varieties are settling in well in the new beds. The blueberries will be cropping this year so another treat to look forward to!
